Alfred Deakin Professor Alison Hutchinson

Professor of Nursing & Director, Centre for Quality and Patient Safety Research, Institute for Health Transformation

Deakin University

Alfred Deakin Professor Alison Hutchinson is Professor of Nursing in the School of Nursing and Midwifery at Deakin University, Director of the Centre for Quality and Patient Safety Research in the Institute for Health Transformation at Deakin University, and holds a Chair in Nursing at Monash Health. Her primary research interest centres on improving care through knowledge translation. As Director of the Centre for Quality and Patient Safety Research she provides strategic direction for the Centre, comprising more than 40 scholars undertaking research in the areas of patient safety, patient experience and workforce development.

In 2019, in recognition of her sustained contribution to nursing research, Professor Hutchinson was awarded the title of Alfred Deakin Professor, which is the highest honour Deakin University can bestow upon a member of the academic staff. In July 2021 she was inducted into the Sigma International Nurse Researcher Hall of Fame

Professor Hutchinson is internationally recognised for her implementation science/knowledge translation research and is an Associate Editor for journals, 'Implementation Science' and 'Implementation Science Communications'. She has attracted competitive research funding from a range of funding bodies.

She has the distinction of being one of only a few Australian nurses to have successfully completed a formal postdoctoral fellowship program overseas, having trained as a Postdoctoral Fellow at the University of Alberta, Canada. Professor Hutchinson received a national fellowship in knowledge translation award from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) and a provincial fellowship award from Alberta Heritage Foundation for Medical Research (now Alberta Innovates).

With more than 145 publications, she has co-authored several book chapters and has published widely in international peer-reviewed journals. Professor Hutchinson has supervised to completion 10 doctoral and 11 master's students and has also provided mentorship for 5 postdoctoral fellows.

Researchers do not just "do" science, they must write science as well. Writing science, therefore, is not only data-based, it is language-based. Good data are not enough – the language you use must ensure clear and persuasive transmission of ideas.

This session will provide some guidance and strategies for writing effective scientific publications of various kinds using strong and effective language. We will examine the processes of producing clear scientific writing, and will give some thought to how research concepts can be made clear through critical thinking and robust writing skills.

Associate Professor Liz Tynan PhD is co-ordinator of the professional development program at the JCU Graduate Research School. She teaches academic writing, editing and critical thinking skills to HDR candidates. She is a prominent researcher of the history of British atomic weapons testing in Australia, and her first book on the topic (Atomic Thunder: The Maralinga Story) won the Prime Minister's Literary Award for Australian History and the CHASS Australia Prize for a Book in 2017. She is a former journalism academic with a background in both print and electronic media, specialising in science writing and editing. She worked for the ABC as a reporter and subeditor, and was later Sydney correspondent for New Scientist. She is co-author of the Oxford University Press textbook Media and Journalism: New Approaches to Theory and Practice, now in its third edition, and co-author and co-ordinating editor of the OUP text, Communication for Business. She is finalising a new book about British atomic tests in Australia, The Secret of Emu Field, to be published by NewSouth Publishing in 2022.
